#### **Approve Minutes**

Will Nelson made a motion, seconded by Kari Henderson-Burke, to approve the Feb. 1 meeting minutes. The minutes were approved by voice vote.

#### **District Updates**

Dr. Sweeting shared the following:

- WESCO opened up for certain sports
- Classified Employee Week is next week
- Submitted a revised reopening plan

#### **Reopening Update**

Dr. Sweeting shared an update from the Snohomish Health District. The recommendations for schools remain the same. The weekly meetings from the health district are changing to bi-weekly meetings on March 2.

Brian Lewis shared information on keeping safe and healthy at school and work. He talked about the daily health screenings that are taking place at schools and the daily attestations among students and staff. These screenings, along with temp checks, universal masking, hand hygiene, physical distancing and staying home if you don't feel well, are having a positive impact in keeping case counts down in our schools.

Krissa Cramer shared health metrics with the committee. Infection rates and hospitalizations continue to drop across the county among all age groups. She also shared case counts in our schools.

Kari Henderson-Burke provided an update on how the P-5 hybrid learning is going at the schools.

#### **ACE Menti Feedback**

Dr. Sweeting shared information about the ACE Menti feedback on reopening schools that was received



at the last meeting.

Under the category on "What's working well," students are really good about wearing masks, teachers are working hard to keep students safe, and clear communication about the plan.

Under the category of "What are the barriers to reopening schools," answer included "None," busing, taking masks off to eat and limited space in buildings makes it hard for students to eat.

Regarding "What additional questions and thoughts do you have," answers included a community approach to reopening, process for closing if there's an outbreak, and praise that ASD has been leading the way in getting students back in school.

# **Equity Updates**

Will Nelson provided an equity update to the committee. He is receiving input on the district's draft equity plan. He hopes to bring it back to the committee in April or May.
